



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INTRODUCTION

Since 1966, the Programme de recherche en démographie historique, or PRDH (Research Program in Historical Demography), has been conducting a large-scale study of the population of the province of Québec prior to 1850. A register is being compiled which will include demographic information on each individual. This detailed reconstruction of the population, made with the help of computers, is expected to result in new and original analyses involving several disciplines. A systematic reading and transcribing of all the parish registers of old Québec is the basis for the work, although population censuses and other documents are also used.

The information is being recorded on magnetic tape making it easily accessible to the public. The Presses de l'Université de Montréal have agreed to publish the complete Repertory listing the source documents for this huge undertaking. The Repertory, probably the only one if its kind in the world, duplicates in practical form almost all the information contained in the parish registers: the first and last names of all those mentioned in every certificate, including witnesses and their spouses and, wherever possible, the sex, age, marital status, mention of whether living or deceased, occupation, kinship, places of residence and origin, etc. of every person mentioned.

These documents will be published in several stages, the first of which groups the information for the seventeenth century: approximately 250,000 names, in 7 volumes which are described in detail in a list appearing at the end of each volume. Volumes 1-5 contain some 32,000 baptismal, marriage and burial certificates taken from the 51 seventeenth-century parishes and missions whose valuable archives have been at least partially preserved. The certificates are classified by government (Québec, Trois-Rivières, Montréal) and parish, following the type of certificate and its chronological order. In addition, the Repertory includes in volume 6 the demographic information contained in the nominal censuses of the XVIIth century and in other documents which supplement, at least partially, information missing in the parish registers.

The use of the Repertory is facilitated by onomastic indices: in volume 1 to 5, by parish; in volume 7, a general index of all 6 volumes. Last names appear in alphabetical order, as do first names in a series sharing one last name. For each name mentioned, the Index gives the type of certificate, its place of registration and its date, or the equivalent for other types of documents; the General Index, furthermore, refers the reader to the volume in which the information may be found.

The Repertory took considerable time to prepare, and required the perfecting of new methods of data collection. These are described in a handbook prepared by the PRDH and published by the Archives nationales du Québec.¹ This handbook is indispensable if the Repertory is to be used to its fullest potential.

The PRDH was not alone in compiling the Repertory. Many students devoted long hours reading and transcribing the source documents and researchers, particularly genealogists, contributed their expertise. We wish to thank them for their ongoing help, now more necessary than ever.

Acknowledging the assistance of all those who collaborated on the Repertory is an impossible task as some persons would inadvertently be overlooked. However, there are some people who must be mentioned, as their contributions are of paramount importance; firstly, Yolande Lavoie, André LaRose and Jean Bergeron, who in turn organized the collecting and reading and transcribing of the manuscripts; secondly, Bertrand Desjardins, Pierre Beauchamp and Yves Landry, who supervised the Repertory's final version; and lastly, Pierre Rosa, who was responsible for the computer programming of the work.

We wish also to thank religious and government authorities for their kind cooperation. The bishops, secretaries of the bishoprics and the priests of the oldest parishes in Québec assisted us with the utmost goodwill.

Even though mistakes are probably inevitable in a complex work of this kind, the Repertory nevertheless constitutes a valuable research aid as it reorganizes and summarizes in practical form the information contained in widely-scattered documents.

KEY TO THE REPERTORY

The source manuscripts for the Repertory have been processed according to strict guidelines. Most of the information, with the exception of proper names, has been coded. In addition, parish names not only appear in code form, but are also written out in full so as to facilitate reading.

1. Sample Page

In the first six volumes, each page has a heading which identifies the certificates or documents recorded thereon. The documents are separated from one another by lines; however, one document may occupy two columns or even two pages.

The following is an example of a page-heading:

Occasionally, as in the case of the lists of migrants, the place-name found in the heading is not the name of a parish. Each type of document has a separate code:

A: recantation	Abjuration	L: liste de migrants	S: burial	sépulture

The codes for places of residence or origin, of which the parish codes are a part, are listed in Appendix 2. In the case of marriage contracts, NOT (notary) replaces the parish code; the code for certificates taken from the Journal des Jésuites is JSJ.

In the case of censuses, each household is numbered, individual families in one household being separated from one another by a broken line.

II. Certificate or Document Heading

Each certificate or document also has a heading, which includes, on the right-hand side, one or two dates, and in some cases, on the left, a source reference. The following is an example of a certificate heading:

The left-hand space is rarely used, as most of the baptism, marriage and burial certificates are taken from religious archives in parish registers. The source is indicated for certificates taken from civil archives or from works such as the Dictionnaire Tanguay. The expression "DATE INTERPOLEE" ("interpolated date") indicated that the date of a certificate has been inferred from the dates of the surrounding certificates.

The international method (year, month, day) is used for every date in a heading; missing information is indicated by dots. For censuses, the year in which the census was taken is followed by the number of the household.

Baptism and burial certificates are the only documents for which two heading dates may be found. In order to facilitate identification, each date applying to these types of certificates is preceded by the following indication:

The date listed on the extreme right appears in the Indices.

When two or more certificates or documents of the same type are recorded on the same day in the same parish, the date found on the extreme right of the heading is followed by a sequence number. The number of the first certificate or document, left blank, is zero, and the following certificates are numbered §1, §2, §3, etc.

III. The Document Proper

The main part of the certificate of document is always written in the same fashion: on the left, a referral number and list of names are given in the following sequence: the proband in the document; his parents or spouse, followed by other persons in their order of appearance on the certificate; the author of the document mentioned last; on the right, if available, the family tie between the proband and another person or persons therein; marital status (C-single, M-married, V-widowed, S-separated or blank); presence (D meaning deceased); and sex (M, F or I-unknown).

All other information appears in the centre, usually on the same line, or on an additional line if needed, and is preceded by a descriptive code:

- h: number of day of hospitalization
- o: place or origin in full, followed by the code in parentheses
- p: code for occupation
- r: place of residence in full, followed by the code in parentheses
- s: mention of signature followed by oui (yes) or non (no)

The age is written in full (e.g. 8 months). The codes for occupations (see Appendix 1) are applicable only to the XVIIth century. Places of residence or origin are listed in Appendix 2. A place named in the Repertory may not be exactly the one named in the manuscript; (accordingly, any given place-name is listed under the parish name). The abbreviation C.P. means "of this parish", in other words, the parish to which the document belongs.

Occasionally, commentaries are inserted at the end of a certificate or document, after the symbol •.

Very long lists of names (a Confirmation list, for example) are often divided into groups of 17, for classification purposes.

Family names have not been standardized in the Repertory. Names appear as they are in the manuscripts, so that one name may be spelled in several different ways; for example, BELLOIN, BELLOUIN, BELOIN, BELOING, BELOUIN, BELOUYN, BLOIN, BLOING, BLOUIN, BLOUYN. First names, however, have been standardized according to modern spelling. The lack of one or more letters is indicated by three suspension points, and the complete absence of first or last names is indicated in the Indices by dots. In censuses, children have been given the father's name unless otherwise indicated.

The page heading follows the format earlier described: the type of certificate (MARIAGES/MARRIAGES) and the parish to which it belongs (ST-AUGUSTIN-DE-DESMAURES) are both indicated; the codes indicating the type of certificate (M for marriage) and the place (444 for St-Augustin-de-Desmaures appear on the right. Appendix 2, listing the place-names codes, indicates that 444 is the code for St-Augustin-de-Desmaures in the County of Portneuf.

The heading for the actual certificate includes on the right the symbol ☐ followed by the date (1698-02-10).

In the certificate proper, the number of each person in his or her order of appearance on the certificate (01 to 10) is in first place, followed by the first and last names (separated by an oblique), then each person's vital statistics.

The entry for the person 01 (JEAN MAURAND) indicates in sequence that he signed the certificate (s: OUI), that his place of origin is rural western France (code 872: the rural area of the West, or that part of France which includes Angoumis, Aunis, Poitou and Saintonge, as explained in Appendix 3), that he is 35 years of age, single (C) and male (M); the person 02 (ANNE MARTIN) also signed the certificate (s: OUI), resides in the parish mentioned at the top of the page (r: C.P. for "of this parish"), is 22 years of age, single (C) and female (F). Their referral numbers, as well as their first and last names, appear in heavy type, to indicate that persons 01 and 02 are the proband of the certificate.

Persons 03 and 04 reside in rural western France (r: France, Ouest/West, rural (872) and are the groom's parents (father of 01 - M (married) - M (male) and mother of 01 - M (married) - F (female)).

Persons 05 and 06 reside in St-Augustin (r: C.P.) and are the bride's parents.

All that is known about persons 07, 08 and 09 is that they are male (M on the far right): they are probably the witnesses.

Person 10 (JEAN DANIEL TESTU), the last entry, is a member of the clergy (p: 02 = profession: clergy, as explained in the codes for the occupations in Appendix 1) and probably drafted the certificate. He resides in St-Augustin (r: C.P.), is single (C) and male (M).

At the top of this page appears the heading for the type of certificate (1681 CENSUS), and the place (QUÉBEC) where the persons mentioned were living followed by the code of the document (R for census) and place (451 for Québec, as indicated in Appendix 2).

The heading for household 53 includes on the right the date of census and the household's number (the 53rd household in Québec in the order of census).

The sequence number, proper names and vital statistics for each person whose name appears in the household's census are included in the document proper.

Person 01 (ÉTIENNE BLANCHON), whose name appears first, is the head of the household. The vital statistics show that he is a textile worker, probably a tailor (24 in the occupations codes, Appendix 1), that he is 38 years of age, married (M) and male (M). Person 02 (ANNE VIDAUT), married and female, is his wife.

Person 03 (JUINEAU) is the husband of 02, married (M), deceased (D) and male (M): clearly, Anne Vidault was Juineau's widow before her marriage to Étienne Blanchon.

Persons 04, 05 and 06 are three daughters of Anne Vidault (02) and Juineau. Persons 07, 08 and 09 are three children of Étienne Blanchon (01). Person 10 (CLAUDE RENARD) is an adopted son of Étienne Blanchon. Each of the seven children's age, family tie, marital status (C for single) and sex (M or F) are recorded.

The hospital sick lists differ somewhat from the other sources as they indicate the lenght of hospitalization. The above example, for the Hôtel-Dieu de Québec (code 452), shows that four patients (names in heavy type) were admitted on July 19, 1699. For example, person 02, Marie Vallé, lives in Québec (r: Notre-Dame-de-Québec—451), is 55 years of age and the wife of person 03, Jolicoeur; she was hospitalized for 13 days (h: 13 jours) during July 1699.

IV. Onomastic Index

In the General Index (Volume 7), each mention of the same family name and first name appears in chronological order as follows:

As explained above, the Index distinguishes between various spellings of a name. In the example given, BLOUF and BLOUFE are treated separately, even though it is the same name. Under JEAN BLOUF it is found that a person of that name first appears in the 1666 Montréal census: he is the third person mentioned in the ninetieth household (90). A certain JEAN BLOUF marries in Montréal on June 24, 1669; in the 1681 census, two JEAN BLOUF entries are recorded in the sixth household of Verchères (623). The document relating to the 1681 census indicates that these two entries are father (38 years) and son (7 years). On June 15 of the same year, a JEAN BLOUF is the fifth person confirmed in Verchères (C 623 05), after which appears, on July 25, the baptism of a JEAN BLOUF, and so it continues. Since all the vital statistics of every Jean Blouf are listed together, it is up to the user to distinguish what events relate to which JEAN BLOUF, by looking also under JEAN BLOUFE, BLOUFFE, BLOUX (?), PLOUF, etc., where additional information is recorded. Another detail is the sequence number following the baptism of November 17, 1697: there were at least two baptisms in Montréal on that same day.

The Indices in the other volumes are similar, and all redundant information has been suppressed.

The indexing and the chronological listing of documents are complementary parts of the same tool, the Index when properly used serving principally as a time-saving intermediary.
