

A Whole New World of Catholic Records

Catholic records can be found in a wide variety of sources: major online providers, like Findmypast, FamilySearch, Ancestry, and MyHeritage, diocesan sites, state and university archives, independent country-wide portals and repertoires. More and more record sets are being digitized and placed online. With simplified access for sacramental records, be sure to investigate related topics, like Catholic cemeteries, schools, and parish histories, to enhance your ancestors' story.

Records include baptisms, marriages, and burials in sizeable collections. Some countries are listed with regions/states rather than dioceses; these are noted with an asterisk (*). Check the FamilySearch wiki page for that country's Catholic church records. Diocesan archives will sometimes be listed. Catholic records will occasionally be found in church records that include all denominations.

Tips for Catholic Records

- Many providers are in the process of adding records, images, and/or indexes. Check their sites regularly to keep up to date.
- The first US diocese, Baltimore, was formed in 1784, and consisted of one church. The U.S. Catholic Church today includes 32 archdioceses, 145 dioceses and the Archdiocese for Military Services. Some areas have undergone many jurisdictional changes. Use the Catholic Hierarchy site (www.catholic-hierarchy.org) to help determine in which diocese an event took place.
- Many ethnic groups attended national parishes in the US. City directories will often identify the ethnic group when listing the Catholic churches. Some dioceses also identify the ethnic affiliation of parishes.
- Keep in mind that sacramental Catholic records are private institutional records. There is no public right to the records.
- Do not contact a parish the week before Easter or Christmas when they are especially busy. It is wise to call or email before mailing a request.
- Request a copy of the original record, if possible. A transcript or extract may have errors.
- It is customary to make a small donation to the parish/diocese for their efforts in locating and providing the record.



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
